INTRODUCTION

"Do not fear, for I am with you, Do not be afraid, for I am your God; I will strengthen you, I will help you, I will uphold you with my victorious right hand." Isaiah 41:10 NRSVue



The National Council of the Churches of Christ in the USA (NCC) joins with our member denominations to affirm that each vote is precious, just as each person is a precious child of God. Voting is the most powerful nonviolent tool we have to create a more perfect union. The right to vote is the way we determine the future for our families, communities, and country. We are stronger as a nation when more people participate in our democracy.

However, we are faced with many challenges as voting laws have changed in 35 states. Polling places have changed. Voter ID procedures have changed. Many voters have been removed from the voter rolls. Members of our churches may not be aware of the changes. In addition, crucial protections that would have been provided by the Freedom to Vote: John R. Lewis Act were never passed by the U.S. Senate.

In the face of such unprecedented challenges, the NCC is working in partnership with Faiths United to Save Democracy to encourage faith leaders to fill-in the gaps and help prepare all people of faith to exercise their civic responsibility by voting safely and fairly. Local congregations can provide valuable resources and reliable information to help their members wade through these barriers to vote.

The NCC is an ally of the voter campaigns created by several of our denominations and we are now inviting additional churches to join the **NCC Voter Empowerment 2022** campaign and take action on the local church level **each month until Election Day**. Churches can play a pivotal role in encouraging each voter to create a plan to vote and make their voice heard.

Excerpt from the NCC Statement "Voting Rights Are Human Rights" made on January 17, 2022:

"But let justice roll down like waters, and righteousness like an ever-flowing stream." Amos 5:24 NRSV

The General Assembly of the National Council of Churches of Christ in the USA adopted a Human Rights Policy Statement in 1963, setting forth general principles related to the inherent worth, rights and responsibilities of all persons. The statement recognizes:

"The right to full participation of the person in political and civic life, including the opportunity: to vote by secret ballot...the right to vote is a basic human right."

The NCC was also actively involved in the Civil Rights Movement, including having our leaders march with the late civil rights icons Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. and Congressman John Lewis across the Edmund Pettus Bridge. We must remain vigilant and resolute to make sure the right to vote is protected.

Our faith compels us.

The 1963 statement also set forth our belief as Christians that "human beings are made in the image of God, that every person is of intrinsic worth before God, and that every individual has a right to the fullest possible opportunities for the development of life abundant and eternal. Denial of rights and freedoms that inhere in an individual's worth before God are not simply a crime against humanity; they are a sin against God" (1963 Statement, using inclusive language.)

Throughout the years and at pivotal moments in history we have reaffirmed these beliefs and statement. This time is no different. We believe that the Church, other faith partners, and civil and human rights advocates must take a stand as the beloved community, articulated by Dr. King:

"An injustice anywhere is a threat to justice everywhere. We are caught in an inescapable network of mutuality, tied in a single garment of destiny. Whatever affects one directly, affects all indirectly." (Dr. King, Jr, Letter from a Birmingham Jail)

Our conscience compels us.

When rights of one are denied, we are all impacted. We must stand together to ensure the full acceptance and citizenship for all in our society, guaranteeing and protecting each person's human rights on an equal basis. The right to vote is the very center and core of a fair and free democracy. To deny access to the vote is to deny the very humanity and sacredness of those denied.

VOTER EMPOWERMENT ACTIONS FOR 2022

• PLAN YOUR CHURCH CAMPAIGN: Organize a voter engagement coordinator and/or team of volunteers to actively provide accurate voting logistical information, help get proper identification, and assist with transportation to the polls.

• EDUCATE ON CHECK-UP SUNDAYS: Teach on the issues that impact your members. Share basic voting information and highlight changes up to Election Day. Make sure all eligible voters in your congregation are registered to vote. Understand what your house of worship can legally do in elections.

• **PREACH AND PRAY ON CHECK-UP SUNDAYS:** Preach messages on justice, righteousness, and civic responsibility and pray for free, fair, and safe elections.

• ENGAGE LOCAL COMMUNITIES ON CHECK-IN WEDNESDAYS: Provide members with social media messages to share on their personal accounts and through their networks to encourage voter turnout. Encourage your younger members to vote.

• HOLD EXPUNGEMENT CLINICS: Work with local, county and state organizations to host expungement clinics so that eligible returning citizens can regain their right to vote.

• HOST CANDIDATE & ISSUE FORUMS: Invite candidates for local and state elections to share their views in a candidate forum or host an issue briefing about a ballot initiative or an important issue impacting your community. Invite candidates and experts to discuss the issue for the congregation and invite the surrounding community to participate.

• HOST TURNOUT SUNDAY SERVICE ON NOVEMBER 6: Prepare your House of Worship to get out and vote.

• **STOP BY POLLING PLACES:** Have faith leaders visit the polling sites of your members to show support and make sure voting rights are upheld. Faith leaders can also encourage voters standing in line to vote outside of polling places. Check local and state laws, many of which have changed since the last election, to find out what's permissible.

JULY 10, 2022 THEME: CHECK YOUR REGISTRATION GET FAMILY AND FRIENDS TO CHECK OR REGISTER / CHECK YOUR HOUSEHOLD TO BE SURE EVERYONE IS REGISTERD AND VOTING / CHECK WITH SENIORS RESIDING IN SENIOR COMMUNITIES



Sample Bulletin Announcement:

Intro #1 This year, we will be participating with other faith communities across the nation to prepare for the upcoming elections. We, as people of faith, simply cannot afford to stay home as not voting can endanger the economic and spiritual vitality of our communities.

Intro #2 We have the power to vote for leaders who will support life-sustaining programs for underserved Americans such as Social Security, Medicare, Medicaid, lower prescription drug costs, police/community relations, criminal justice reform, and Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP/Food Stamps).

Main announcement:

This month CHECK YOUR REGISTRATION / GET FAMILY AND FRIENDS TO CHECK OR REGISTER / BE SURE YOUR HOUSEHOLD IS REGISTERD AND VOTING. 17 million U.S. voters were purged from the voting rolls between 2016 and 2018. Check your voting status, register, or re-register.

- Register or re-register, if necessary.
- Make sure 5 friends, family members and co-workers are registered to vote.

CHECK-UP SUNDAYS EVERY 2nd SUNDAY UNTIL TURNOUT SUNDAY

AUGUST 14, 2022 THEME: CHECK VOTER ID REQUIREMENTS

Background information: 35 states have laws requesting or requiring voters to show some form of identification at the polls. The remaining 15 states and the District of Columbia use other methods to verify the identity of voters. Many states have enacted tougher voter identification requirements that require specific ID's. Low-income and marginalized citizens, students, and seniors are less likely to possess these forms of identification.

Churches can help alleviate confusion and make sure their congregants and community are #VoteReady by spreading the word early in the summer about what kind of ID is required to vote in their communities. Additional support might be necessary and churches can provide these services, such as internet access, help filling out the appropriate forms, providing a ride and/or accompanying them to the office issuing the ID, or even financial assistance to pay the fees.

SEPTEMBER 11, 2022 – THEME: MAKE YOUR VOTING PLAN

Background information: Encourage members to check the polling location, voting dates, and voting hours, then make a personal plan to vote.



Find local information at sources such as VOTE.ORG (<u>https://www.vote.org/</u>) on how to:

- Vote by mail
- Find early voting locations
- Locate a polling place or ballot dropbox.

In addition to this information, other material to research and share in this month's bulletin announcement for Check-Up Sunday, include:

- Whether voters have the right to receive voting materials in their own language because English is not their first language. Contact the local elections office to find out and share the information.
- What accommodations are available for voters with mobility challenges. Many polling places still aren't easily accessible to voters with disabilities or persons with special needs, including reading ballots. Contact the local elections office for information about accessibility at your local polling places and share the information.
- If members need to vote by Absentee Ballot, what are the deadlines for the absentee application and the absentee ballot itself? Share the information including how to contact the local elections office for assistance. Plan to set aside time after worship services to review applications for absentee ballots and answer questions from members. Be sure to reach out to members living in senior citizens' housing and assisted living communities who may need help with voter registration and absentee ballots.
- Find out if your jurisdiction has early voting and encourage members to take advantage of this option. Find information at Vote Early Day: <u>https://voteearlyday.org/</u>

Sample Bulletin Announcement:

Exercise your power and protect your right to vote by checking the polling station location, voting dates, and voting hours, then make a personal plan. If you require assistance reading a ballot or casting your ballot on Election Day because English is not your first language, you have mobility challenges, or you need to vote by Absentee Ballot, (provide details). Contact our Voter Engagement Team Coordinator _____ at (phone number/email) if you need help in finding the specifics to vote. (Add early voting if applicable.)



CHECK-UP SUNDAYS EVERY 2nd SUNDAY UNTIL TURNOUT SUNDAY

OCTOBER 9, 2022 THEME: BE PREPARED

Make sure church members think about supplies to take to the polls such as snacks, water, a chair, or a voting buddy. Advise

everyone to arrive early and know their rights. Have your church offer snack packs and/or allow members to borrow folding chairs to take to the polls. Reach out to members, especially seniors, to offer rides to the polls.

Sample Bulletin Announcement:

Exercise your power, protect your right to vote, and do your civic duty by getting to the polls. Bring water. Bring snacks. Bring music. Bring a chair. Find a voting buddy. Arrive early. Know your rights. If you are in line to vote when the polls close, stay in the line! You have the right to cast your vote. Pick up a snack pack and a folding chair from the church office if you don't have one (provide details on how). Contact our Voter Engagement Team Coordinator

But let justice roll down like water, and righteousness like an ever-flowing stream. Amos 5:24 NRSVue

Woe to those who make iniquitous decrees, who write oppressive statutes, to turn aside the needy from justice and to rob the poor of my people of their right, to make widows their spoil and to plunder orphans! Isaiah 10.1-2 NRSVue

Speak out, judge righteously, defend the rights of the poor and needy. Proverbs 31:9 NRSVue

He has told you, O mortal, what is good, and what does the Lord require of you but to do justice and to love kindness and to walk humbly with your God? Micah 6:8 NRSVue

O Lord, how long shall I cry for help, and you will not listen? Or cry to you "Violence!" and you will not save? Why do you make me see wrongdoing and look at trouble? Destruction and violence are before me; strife and contention arise. So the law becomes slack, and justice never prevails. The wicked surround the righteous; therefore judgment comes forth perverted. IRS GUIDE FOR HOUSES OF WORSHIP*

<u>D0</u>

DO: Publish news stories about campaigns...the congregation should be kept informed as best as possible. Also, discuss candidates' positions on issues with congregation.

DO: Rent out the faith organization facilities (e.g. kitchens, athletic facilities, community rooms) for political activities...regular rates MUST apply.

DO: Provide rentals of membership lists at regular rates.

DO: Allow candidates to make appearances at the organization's events/services.

DO: Distribute candidate campaign literature as an individual faith leader.

DO: Distribute candidate surveys and/or voting records of office holders.

DO: Publish political ads; as long as the regular rates are applied.

DO: Use organization's vehicle to transport people to vote.

DO: Lobby & Campaign for or against legislation as congregation or individual.

DO NOT

DO NOT: Support or oppose the candidates on the congregation's behalf.

DO NOT: Use the congregation's funding to give financial contributions of any kind to the candidates/office holders.

DO NOT: Impose your opinions on the congregation.

DO NOT: Publish faith organization editorials that support or oppose candidates.

DO NOT: Publish political ads as a donation.

DO NOT: Display candidate's literature on organization's vehicle used to transport people to vote.

DO NOT: Distribute candidate campaign literature as a congregation.
