Theological Grounding

The Baptism of Jesus- Matthew 3:13-17

¹³ Then Jesus came from Galilee to the Jordan to be baptized by John. ¹⁴ But John tried to deter him, saying, "I need to be baptized by you, and do you come to me?"



The word *compassion* literally means to "suffer with".

If you're trying to serve someone who is hurting and it doesn't hurt *you* in the process, you're doing it wrong.

The cost of compassion isn't money. It's *comfort*.

COMPASSION

What is Compassion Fatigue?

- Is a condition characterized by a gradual lessening of compassion over time
- Those with the most empathy are the most at risk
- Decrease in experiences of pleasure
- Persistent stress and anxiety
- Sleeplessness or nightmares, and a pervasive negative attitude





 Compassion Fatigue has been described as the "cost of caring" for others in emotional and physical pain.

 It is characterized by deep physical and emotional exhaustion and a pronounced change in the helper's ability to feel empathy for others.



Signs and Symptoms of Compassion Fatigue

- Ability to function is interfered with or altered
- Situation or incident does not seem "typical or ordinary", it feels traumatic
- "Compassion stress" impinges upon or breaks through normal boundaries
- Regularly waking up tired in the morning and struggling to get to work

- Feeling as if you are working harder but accomplishing less
- Becoming frustrated/irritated easily
- Losing compassion for some people while becoming overly involved in others
- Routinely feeling bored or disgusted
- Experiencing illness, aches and pains

Burn Out and Compassion Fatigue

- Emotional exhaustion
- Reduced sense of personal accomplishment or meaning
- Mental exhaustion
- Decreased interactions with others
- Depersonalization





Secondary Traumatic Stress (STS)

- Result of bearing witness to a traumatic event (or series of events) which can lead to PTSD like symptoms
- Rapid onset and associated with a particular event
- May include feeling afraid, difficulty falling asleep, images of upsetting event, avoiding things that remind you of the event



Other Important Religious Trends (and Predictions)

Attendance:


- Trends suggest that attendance figures will not reach levels common prior to the pandemic
- Worship attendance will average 80% of pre-COVID numbers. Sources are predicting that attendance will not fully recover in 2022. As more COVID variants enter the world, there will continue to be a hesitation by many people to attend weekly worship gatherings.

Giving:

 Financial Support: Church giving will decline 5%. Many churches experienced increased giving or at least level giving in 2020 and 2021. Government injected liquidity has gone away

Other Important Religious Trends

Numbers and Form of Churches:

- Closures/Downsizing: Data suggests as many as 15,000 churches in this nation will close or will be forced to merge in 2022.
- More churches will merge or be adopted than any period in 30 years. There is a greater willingness of struggling churches to be adopted, and there are more churches willing to adopt other congregations than at any point in many years. This movement will prove to be pivotal to keep the doors open of churches that would otherwise close. It is also an indicator that the multisite movement will continue to grow.
- Micro Church: The "micro church" consists of a congregation of 30 or fewer attendees. While these churches were on an upward trend pre-COVID, what are we likely to see moving forward?
- Neighborhood churches will become a movement. We think this movement has already begun, but we will see clear indicators of it in 2022. We define a neighborhood church as a congregation that is laser-focused on ministering to a specific geographical area typically described as a neighborhood



Other Trends in Religion


- Rethinking Denominationalism: "Denominational structures will begin to look more like networks."
- The Great Resignation: What is being called the "Great Resignation" is signaling that as many as 20% of church pastors will be resigning their pulpits.
- Part-Time Clergy: There are more than one million part-time pastors. This phenomenon is known as "co-vocational ministry".

Scenarios

O No switching

This scenario imagines no person in America has changed or will change their religion after 2020.

O Steady switching

Movement into and out of Christianity remains stable at recently observed rates. That is, in each new generation, 31% of Christians become religiously unaffiliated before they turn 30, and 21% of unaffiliated people become Christian.

O Rising disaffiliation with limits

In each new generation, a growing share of Christians switch out before they turn 30, while a shrinking share of 'nones' switch in. But the switching rate is capped to prevent the share of Christians who leave the faith from rising above 50%.

O Rising disaffiliation without limits

In each new generation, a growing share of Christians switch out before they turn 30, while a shrinking share of 'nones' switch in. No cap is imposed on switching rates.

Other Trends in Religion continued

- Ministry training will begin to evolve into different models. Seminaries, Bible colleges, and Christian universities are not going away. But new models will begin to grow at a rapid pace. (CTS example)
- Quality vs. Quantity: Vital churches will focus on engagement and content over attendance. When YouTube measures engagement, it not only looks at the number of people viewing...but how long those viewers are watching.
- Building Video Messaging: Live video chats and messaging are proving successful, as are Instagram Reels, short-form videos.



What will it take for a Revival*


- The Church needs to learn how to speak compellingly to non-Christian people
